## **Resources for Librarians – Voting Information**

Librarians can play a key role in helping patrons register to vote. Even if you are located near your municipal clerk, your weekend and evening hours give more people a chance to register. Any new service attracts new patrons to the library. Libraries have computers, printers, and copiers, which many people will need to register.

Citizens who have a WI driver license or DOT-issued ID can register to vote online at MyVote.wi.gov, but some may need help. Page 2 lists key resources that will enable most voters to complete their registration online.

If a voter needs more assistance than you can provide, the Dane County Voter ID Coalition is a great source for expert assistance at 608-285-2141. This group was cofounded by the League of Women Voters of Dane County and the Dane County NAACP.

## How librarians can help patrons become voters.

- 1. Make bookmarks and other informational materials available to patrons.
- 2. When patrons apply for a library card or change their address, give them a bookmark from the League of Women Voters (LWV) with information about voter registration and Voter ID. Let them know that if they have an unexpired WI driver license or WI ID card they can complete their registration at myvote.wi.gov until 20 days before an election.
- 3. Help patrons with voter registration until 20 days before an election. (See the step-by-step guide *Helping Voters* with Registration and Voter ID on the next page.)
  - Patrons with an unexpired WI driver license or WI ID card can register online at <a href="mayvote.wi.gov">myvote.wi.gov</a>. They may need to use a library computer or have help from a librarian.
  - Patrons who do **not** have an unexpired WI driver license or WI ID can complete a paper registration. The library can make printed registration forms available. Or, patrons can start an application at myvote.wi.gov. The website directs them to print the form and include proof of residence (POR), which can be copied on the library copier. Librarians can help patrons find and print a document that can be used for POR. For example, the page in their LINKcat account showing their current residence can be printed and used for POR. The completed, signed registration form with POR is mailed or delivered to their clerk's office. MyVote provides clerk contact information based on a voter's address.

- 4. Refer patrons who do not have a WI driver license or WI ID and need Voter ID to <a href="mailto:bringit.wi.gov">bringit.wi.gov</a>, or refer them to the LWV bookmark.
- 5. Support or organize voter outreach events during key weeks in 2022, such as July 5 through July 18 or October 3 through October 19. Inform patrons that, in addition to registration, they can see a sample ballot, request an absentee ballot, or find their polling place at myvote.wi.gov.
